
New GCSE Qualifications

The main features of the new GCSEs are:

- A new grading scale of 9 to 1 is going to be used, with 9 being the top grade.
- Assessment will be mainly by exam, with much less coursework or controlled assessment.
- There will be new content and more depth of content in all subject areas, necessary for them to be approved by Ofqual.
- Courses have been designed to have final terminal examinations and will no longer be divided up into modules. All exams will be taken at the end of Year 11.
- There will only be two tiers of entry in subjects where one exam paper does not give all students the opportunity to show their knowledge
- Resit opportunities will only be available each November in English language and maths.

Key features of reporting at QEGS:

Three points in the year for collecting and sharing data Information given will be:

- Progress Grade (A, B, C, D)
- Attitude to Learning Score (1, 2, 3, 4)
- Target Grade for end of Year 11.



Target Grades:

- Targets are set for the end of Year 11
- Set in each subject based on prior attainment, entrance test data and CAT scores
- Aspirational and challenging
- Reviewed regularly



Progress Grades:

A: The student is progressing exceptionally well. Their current progress means that they are likely to exceed their target grade at the end of Year 11.

B: The student is progressing very well. Their current progress means that they are likely to meet the target grade at the end of Year 11.

C: The student's progress is currently below our high expectations. Their current progress means that they are working below their target grade at the end of Year 11. This is not currently a cause for concern, but will be monitored.

D: The student's progress is significantly below our expectations. Intervention is required and will be discussed with the student and their parents.
