Year 12 Earth Science Expedition

Our Year 12 Earth Scientists set sail for the Isle of Arran this activities week. Geologists, geographers and environmental scientists slapped on sun cream and explored the rich landscape of the island from Monday through to Friday.

Day 1:

Earth scientists got to work straight away, investigating the geology of the coastline.

Day 2:

Geologists explored 'Hutton's Unconformity', a fossilised lightning strike and other geological features, finishing the day with expertly drawn rose diagrams in the Geopark room.

Geographers and Environmental Scientists scaled Cnoc Nan Sgrath, investigating the flora and fauna and exploring the historical peat cuttings.

The Environmental Scientists and Geographers evaluated the significance of peat bogs vs forestry in carbon sequestration. They then moved on to study zonation and their data will contribute to the local community costal management project.

The Geologists looked at dinosaur footprints and completed independent graphic logs.



DofE was set up by HRH Prince Phillip in 1956. The award's original purpose was bridge the gap between leaving formal education at 15 and entering into National Service at 18, so that young men made the best use of their free time, found interests and acquired

Nowadays, the programme has evolved and grown exponentially. Any young person between the ages of 14-24 years of age can take part, with the focus on building skills and confidence in young people. Over 130 countries and territories offering DofE programmes.



School Events

Carnegie Shadowing Day

Students from across Eden gathered at Queen Elizabeth Grammar School in Penrith for a day of activities shadowing this year's Yoto Carnegie Medal for Illustration shortlist.

The event was organised by QEGS's librarian, Kimberley Lawson, for schools who are part of a local enrichment cluster. Students from nine schools enjoyed a range of tasks, each one focussed on a different book from the shortlist.

Chair of the Yoto Carnegie Medals, Jake Hope, attended the event. Mr Hope, himself a published author, is an expert in children's literature and visual literacy. He ran a session exploring 'Rescuing Titanic' by Flora Delargy, which tells the story of the ship Carpathia rescuing survivors of the Titanic disaster. Students translated some Morse code messages and designed their own interior for a luxury ocean liner.

Mr Hope said:

"I really loved having the opportunity to talk with the students and hear

their views on 'Rescuing Titanic'. It was a really upbeat and enjoyable day."

are also based on true stories. 'The Visible Sounds' by Yin Jianling and Yu Rong is based on the story of the celebrated Chinese dancer Lihua Tai. Students analysed the use of colour in the title and created some onomatopoeic poetry inspired by the use of language in the book. 'Saving Sorya' by Trang Nguyen and Jeet Zdung explores the rainforests of south east Asia with a character based on the author's experiences working as a wildlife conservationist in Vietnam. Students contrasted the different artistic styles used in the book and completed an information literacy activity about sun bears.

An original piece of art, inspired by the final book, "The Comet" by Joe Todd-Stanton was created during the day. In an activity run by QEGS A-level art students, the visiting pupils all contributed to a huge mural, which will now be displayed in the library at QEGS.

Enrichment Cluster coordinator, Annette Thornton, said:

"We are so grateful to the team at

QEGS for providing such a wonderful event. I have heard from our children, teaching assistants and other schools about how good it was Two of the other titles students explored and how much they had enjoyed it."

> QEGS librarian, Kimberley Lawson, said: "It was such a pleasure to share these fantastic books with students. Visual literacy is a real skill but one which students don't always have the chance to explore in depth. So much can be drawn out of the illustrations in the titles we have looked at and I hope we have inspired the students to look at illustrated books in more depth in the future."





Salters Chemistry Festival







Mrs Bent & Mrs Cocker had the pleasure of escorting 10 gifted and talented chemistry students to the Salter's Chemistry Festival, held at Newcastle University on Thursday 25th May.

The Salters' Institute's Festivals of Chemistry are aimed at 14-16 year olds. Their Festivals encourage learners to 'Discover Chemistry', explore the subject and see how it can be a pathway to many careers.

The day started with a fascinating talk about X-Ray Crystallography from Key Note Speaker Dr Mike Probert, Inorganic Chemistry Lecturer at Newcastle University. The students were then able to take part in synthesising aspirin (an A-Level practical!) and after lunch, tested their sample using instrumental methods such as melting point apparatus and IR spectroscopy. Congratulations to Ainara and Cameron, who scored 99.51% purity with their synthesised product. The day closed with a panel session with three guest speakers who all had varying expertise in careers in chemistry, and inspired the students about the different roles they could attain if they study chemistry at university.


The QEGs students impressed the judges with their innovative solutions and teamwork skills. For their outstanding achievements, they were awarded the Industrial Cadets Challenger Award.


Following the success of this year's sell-out Shrek musical extravaganza, James Laidlaw turned his attention to endeavours less ogrely, exchanging green face paint and memorable roars for the recitation of verse, entering into the national Poetry By Heart competition.

His discerning selections and no-less mature renditions of the complex 'The God Abandons Antony' (C.P. Cavafy) and the heart-rending elegy 'My Father in a White Space Suit' (Yehuda Amichai) garnered critical acclaim, with competition judges praising James' 'calm authority' and 'sensitivity' which helped 'illuminate' the works – and resulted with a place in the national final, which took place in London on the 26th June at the Globe Theatre.


The event saw James take to the glorious Sam Wanamaker Playhouse – a faithful recreation of a candlelit 17th century Shakespearean theatre – before delivering his perceptive recitation to packed seats at the Globe itself, sharing the stage with renowned poets Glyn Maxwell and Jean Sprackland, the ever-popular Daljit Nagra, as well as former poet laureate Andrew Motion, founder of the prestigious competition.

Whilst James does not walk away with the coveted trophycabinet glassware on this occasion, his performance goes some way to dispelling the all-too-common myth that poetry need be dusty, stale, and passive. For readers of the newsletter tempted to follow in his footsteps, next year's competition launches on National Poetry Day, the 5th October – one for the diary.

Trip To Dove Cottage

In the museum, they were surprised by leeches and William's socks, then students had fun picking out familiar passages from Dorothy's diaries. Some students even practised signing their signature with a quill! Finally, students engaged in a stimulating workshop on Wordsworth's 'Lucy Gray' and wrote their own- rather wonderful-Romantic poetry, as demonstrated here by Amber Jago and Emily Watling.

The six finalists were from Aberdeenshire, Southampton and all points in between. Eimhear came through three qualifying rounds - representing the North.





Young Textile Technologist Competition




Jemima Evans and Erin Wohl entered the Rotary Club Young Textile Technologist competition.
